

Access for All

Manor Road is a level site and is accessible by gates on Manor Road and Courtenay Road and a stile from Minsmere Road.

There are surfaced paths in the section of woodland between Manor Road and Courtenay Road that are wheelchair and pushchair friendly.

Horses are welcome along a marked route connecting to a bridleway on neighbouring land (see map for details).

Friends of Manor Road

The Friends of Manor Road was formally set up in 2002 with support from BTCV, Bath & North East Somerset Council and Envolve. The group, which is open to all local residents, meets monthly to discuss ongoing management and community projects in the woodland.

There are monthly task days when projects such as stone walling, tree pruning and hedge planting are carried out. A birdbox project has also been carried out in conjunction with the local school.

The Friends group raises some of its own funds through various grant schemes to support additional work in the Woodland.

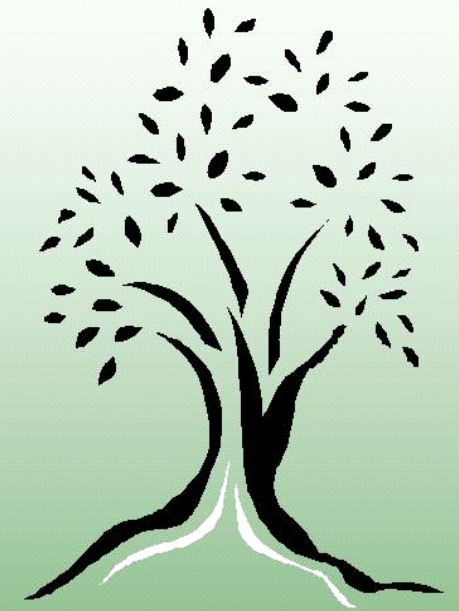
The woodland is owned and managed by Bath & North East Somerset Council with the help of the Friends Group.

Community Woodland

Manor Road Community Woodland

Manor Road Community Woodland lies on the eastern edge of Keynsham and close to Salford Parish.

The woodland also lies within the Forest of Avon area. The Forest of Avon is an initiative that aims to create a greener and healthier environment for the future - right on people's doorsteps.

Over 17 000 trees and shrubs have been planted on the 21-hectare site since 1993 with grant aid from the Forestry Commission. Most of these trees and shrubs are native broadleaves and reflect some of the species already found in the area.

While visiting the site look out for the spectacular views over to the Cotswolds—in particular Kelston Round Hill. Heritage features within the site include traditional stone walls and the site is a haven for wildlife. Many different birds use the woodland — keep an eye open for Bullfinches and Whitethroats.

Manor Road is one of the best examples of new community woodland in the Forest of Avon and is very popular with local people and visitors alike. Enjoy it!
